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Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide a basic understanding of contemporary German politics. This course surveys German politics since World War II, with emphasis on the following areas: Germany's constitutional arrangements; Germany before and after reunification; the party system; elections; and, the European Union. Students are encouraged to use the Internet to gather information and update their knowledge of the material beyond the assigned readings.

Course Requirements

1. Readings – Students are expected to read ALL the assigned readings before class (most of the reading are very short, do not worry!).
2. Class participation – Students are expected to attend all class meetings; lectures, reviews and discussions. Students are also expected to take an active part in class. Participation includes, but not limited to, answering surveys, discussing topics, prepare summaries of the readings, and present them in class.
3. Midterm examination – The midterm examination will take place in our regular class on Monday, August 28th. The midterm will be 35% of your final grade, and will include both multiple choice questions and a longer writing essay. The essay question will be heavily influenced by the readings. The best way to answer the essay question is to cover everything that answer the prompt, but include only relevant information for answering the prompt. Be sure to bring blue books.
4. Final Examination – The final is not cumulative, but the pre-midterm information is very useful for the final. The final worth 50% of the final grade. The final will have a similar structure to the midterm, but will include more questions. The final will take place in our regular class on the final day of class (Thursday, September 14th). Be sure to bring blue books.
